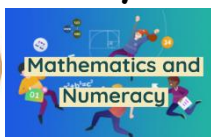

Flag of the United States facts for kids

Kids Encyclopedia Facts

The **flag of the United States of America** is a national [flag](#). It represents the freedom of the United States.

The flag of the United States has 7 red stripes and 6 white stripes. These 13 stripes stand for the original [thirteen colonies](#). The flag also has a blue *canton*, a rectangle in the top left corner. The canton has one white star for every state.

When a new state joins the United States a new flag is made with an extra star. The new flag is first flown on [Independence Day](#), which is celebrated on and also called the "Fourth of July."

The last states to join the United States were [Alaska](#) and [Hawaii](#) in 1959. Alaska joined on January 3, 1959, so the new flag with 49 stars was first flown on July 4, 1959. Because Hawaii joined on August 21, 1959, the flag with 50 stars was not flown until July 4, 1960.

The colors in the flag are [red](#), [white](#) and [blue](#). The colors have no special meaning in the flag, but in the [coat of arms](#) white stands for purity and innocence, red stands for bravery and strength, and blue for watchfulness, perseverance, and justice.

The flag is also often called the **Stars and Stripes**, the **Star-Spangled Banner**, or **Old Glory**. The [national anthem](#) of the United States references the flag, calling it the "Star-Spangled Banner."

The US presidential election 2020

The 2020 United States presidential election happened on November 3, 2020. Voters selected presidential electors who will then vote on December 14, 2020 to either elect a new President and Vice President or re-elect the incumbents. On November 7, most news agencies said that Joe Biden won the election and became the president-elect of the United States. He will be inaugurated on January 20, 2021.

Donald Trump, the 45th President, started a campaign to be President again in the Republican primaries. Several state Republican Party organisations have cancelled their primaries in a show of support for his candidacy. He became the presumptive nominee in March 2020

Geography of the United States facts for kids

The **United States** is the third or fourth biggest **country** in the world. Only **Russia** and **Canada** are bigger. If you do not count the area of the **Great Lakes**, **China** is also bigger. Its geography varies a lot. The **area** is about 3,717,000 square miles, or about 9,629,000 square kilometers. The highest point is **Mount McKinley, Alaska** and the lowest point is **Death Valley, California**.

Territorial expansion of the United States

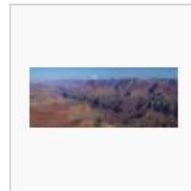
The geographic center is in **Butte County, South Dakota**. The geographic center of the 48 states is in **Smith County, Kansas**.

Climate

The climate varies along with the geography, from [tropical](#) (hot and wet in summer, warm and dry in winter) in [Florida](#) and [Hawaii](#) to [tundra](#) (cold all year) in [Alaska](#). Large parts of the country have warm summers and cold winters. Most of the northern U.S. gets [snow](#) in winter. Some parts of the western United States, like parts of California, have a [Mediterranean climate](#). The southeastern United States can get [hurricanes](#). Parts of the southern United States are [subtropical](#) (hot in summer and cool in winter). [Tornadoes](#) happen a lot in the Midwest.

The highest recorded [temperature](#) is 134 degrees [Fahrenheit](#) (57 degrees [Celsius](#)) and the lowest recorded temperature is -80 degrees Fahrenheit (-62 degrees Celsius).

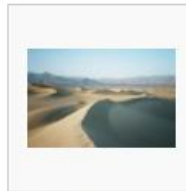

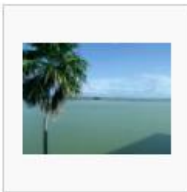
